- 1. Call to Order The meeting was called to order at 7:02 p.m.
- 2. Approval of the Agenda: MOVED and seconded to approve the agenda as circulated. CARRIED UNANIMOUSLY
- 3. Approval of Minutes MOVED and seconded to approve the minutes of November 18, 2015 as circulated. CARRIED UNANIMOUSLY

4. Staff Report/Presentation:

Chair Kerrie Reay welcomed those in attendance and introduced members of the Community Grant Review Committee.

The Director of Financial Services reviewed the eligibility criteria for Category B Community Grants and provided an overview of the screening procedures, as outlined in Policy 5.1, *Community Grant Program Policy, 2013.* Mr. Blackhall further reviewed the differences between Category A (Program Type) grants and Category B (Project Type) grants.

The Director of Financial Services provided a report outlining the total requests for grant funding and the amounts available for disbursement.

5. April 30, 2015 Category B grant applications:

Presentations were made from the following groups:

Communica: Dialogue and Resolution Services

Kathleen Bellamano, representing Communica Dialogue and Resolution Services spoke regarding their organization's application for a Category B Community Grant. Funds requested from the District of Sooke for the Supported Family Mediation program will be used only for families from Sooke.

Committee discussion:

• Dispute resolution and family mediation services should be provincial responsibilities.

District of Sooke May 11, 2016

- Clarification of allowable expenses for Category B grants. Wages are not an allowable expense.
- Discussion of regional funding for the program. Colwood is the only other municipality listed.

Harmony Project Society of British Columbia

Anne MacDougall, representing the Harmony Project Society of British Columbia spoke regarding their organization's application for a Category B Community Grant.

Committee discussion:

- The project has come before the Community Grant Review Committee in the past and was not funded. At that time, the project was encouraged to apply for incorporation as a BC Society, which they have done.
- Partnerships and in-kind contributions from the community are plentiful.

Rotary Club of Sooke

John Topolniski representing Rotary Club of Sooke spoke regarding their organization's application for a Category B Community Grant. The Rotary Club wishes to construct Phase 2 of an educational garden at John Muir Elementary School.

Committee discussion:

• Phase 1 of the project is already completed, which speaks to the support for the project. There are many partnerships and in-kind contributions.

Scouts Canada: Cascadia Council – Camp Barnard

Gary Hendrun representing Scouts Canada: Cascadia Council – Camp Barnard spoke regarding their organization's application for a Category B Community Grant. Camp Barnard is looking to make improvements to their Keego Kitchen facilities.

Committee discussion:

- The District of Sooke has contributed to projects at Camp Barnard in the past.
- Camp Barnard was encouraged to ask other municipalities and the Capital Regional District for funds as the camp is not located in Sooke's boundaries and is used by groups form other municipalities.
- Clarification of Canada 150 grant and the requirements for matching funds.

Sooke Saltwater Series

Ron Neitsch and Elden Smith, representing the Sooke Saltwater Series spoke regarding their organization's application for a Category B Community Grant. The Saltwater Series is looking for funds to purchase a tent and a BBQ for use during their events.

Committee discussion:

- The Saltwater Series is an off-season economic driver, which is good for the community.
- The event has good sponsorship and support in the business community.

District of Sooke May 11, 2016

Sooke Region Community Health Network

Christine Bossi and Loretta Deutcher, representing Sooke Region Community Health Network spoke regarding their organization's application for a Category B Community Grant. The Community Health Network is looking for funds to repair the deteriorating community gardens at the Sooke Child, Youth and Family Centre.

Committee discussion:

- Clarification of garden users and accessibility to the public.
- District of Sooke was an initial funder of the project 10 years ago.
- Discussion of whether contractor's fees can be included as an eligible expense under Category B grants. The Director of Financial Services clarified that capital projects can include the cost of construction.

Sooke River Bluegrass Festival

Phil Shaver and Larry Statland, representing Sooke River Bluegrass Festival spoke regarding their organization's application for a Category B Community Grant.

Committee discussion:

- Clarification of eligible expenses. Site expenses could be considered for Category B funding.
- Discussion of amount of "site expenses" that are payable to the Sooke Community Association.

Sooke Transition Town Society

Michael Tacon and Jeff Bateman representing Sooke Transition Town Society spoke regarding the proposed "Great Reskilling" project.

Committee discussion:

- Clarification of eligible expenses. Venue rental, promotion, printing and signage are eligible expenses.
- Discussion of community collaborations and avoiding duplication of services already offered in the community.
- The committee encouraged Sooke Transition Town Society to include more detailed cost information in their application. For example, when and were each event will take place and an itemized cost breakdown for each of the expenses listed.
- Discussed coming before Council on the 24th of May 2016 with amendments to their application.

Re: Community Grants Program Applications

The Community Grant Program is designed to assist organizations to improve the well being of the community as a whole; through community projects, programs, services, activities or events located primarily in the District of Sooke. The program has two categories of funding; Category A (annual grants - program type) and Category B (bi-annual grants - project type).

District of Sooke Policy 5.1, *Community Grants Program Policy, 2014* lists two application dates for Category B Community Grants as follows:

- 2. Application Procedures
 - b) Grant applications under Category B from groups or organizations will be considered for funding twice per calendar year.
 - i. The first application deadline is April 30th of each year;
 - ii. <u>The second application deadline is September 30th</u> of each year subject to availability of funds after the April 30th grants are awarded.

September 30, 2016 applications received:

The 2016 budget for Category B grants is \$50,000, of which **\$18,964.87** remains after the April 30th grant approvals and disbursements.

Sooke Community Choir Society – organization, mandate, programs, benefits and impact

The choir was formed in 1989 and incorporated as a society in 1992. The choir has been performing for the communities of the Sooke area for over 27 years: public concerts, churches, school concerts, memorial services, Armistice services at the Sooke Legion, and Ayre Manor. We are a performance choir. Our mandate and purpose is to enrich our society by inviting youth and adults to participate - create beautiful music, inspire others to sing, engage the choir and community volunteers with all aspects of concert productions/performances and where possible contribute to our community through special targeted fund raisers – e.g. Sooke Food Bank, school choral programs, youth sponsorships. With weekly choral practices and rehearsals from September through to June, with the assistance of our professional artistic director Bruce Ruddell and our piano accompanist Kathy Russell, our 65 choir members perform beautiful music for all ages to enjoy. The benefits impact our performers, our audiences and volunteers.

The impact of these 2 exceptional award winning professional teachers serving our community and choir is beneficial and rewarding for over 2000 Sooke residents who attend our concerts and performances. We receive rave reviews. Our choir continues to flourish – since 2014 we have grown from a choir of 23 to 65, almost tripling in size. And our audiences are growing season by season!

The numbers of Sooke businesses and supporters, citizens and volunteers involved with the choir and its productions each year is close to 200. Please see attached spring 2016 concert program where our supporters and production volunteers are recognized. In addition to the choral performances we collaborate with several key Sooke groups to share resources and other cultural initiatives – Sooke schools, Sooke Fine Arts and the Sooke Philharmonic Society. We are a Sooke asset that enriches the lives of many and contributes to Sooke's unique culture.

Project description – Protecting the choir's Steigerman grand piano, protecting the refinished community hall floor.

Project uniqueness and rationale why we should receive District of Sooke community grant funds

Since May of 2015 the Sooke Community Choir has used the historic Sooke Community hall as its primary concert venue and weekly rehearsal hall. Since that date we have presented 3 concert series. Each year the choir is able to invest in its production and venue assets – last year a hall lighting system, this year essential piano accessories to protect the grand piano gifted to our choir in April 2015. The hall

is the home for this piano, and may be used by a number of different Sooke culture groups. With multiple recreational and special interest groups' use of the hall it's essential to protect our piano valued at \$30,000. To store the piano up on the stage is impractical – for every move up to the stage, and back down again (weekly) we would have to hire professional piano movers. With every move thee is the risk the piano could be damaged. To this end the choir requires some extra funds to ensure the piano can be protected on the floor and we can meet the rental requirements – make it easy to move the piano on the floor without damaging it. **Our project includes the building of a piano crate, purchase of a piano dolly, purchase of a custom fitted piano cover designed for Steigerman pianos, and an appropriate floor lamp so our accompanist can read her music.**

Purpose of project

Our concert and rehearsal production costs can be covered with community support, provincial support (small gaming grant), ticket sales and choir membership fees. However for special projects where we need to protect our assets we require extra funds such as municipal community grants. The owners of the hall, the Sooke Community Association have requested that we build a special crate for the piano to be housed in, and to use what is known as a piano dolly or piano truck to move the piano with ease and not damage the refinished floor. As well we need a custom built piano cover, and a special floor lamp for our piano accompanist to use. Currently we have no floor lamp or piano cover other than an old blanket.

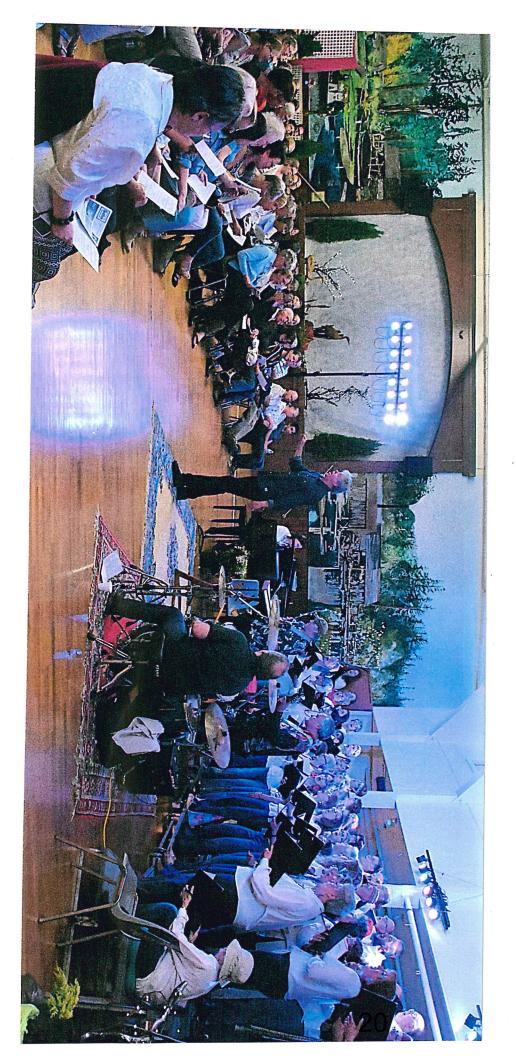

Sooke Harbour Players is delighted to be bringing Annie, The Musical to Sooke.

ANNIE, Written by Thomas Meehan, Music by Charles Strouse, Lyrics by Martin Charnin.

This heart-warming musical is the rags-to-riches story of plucky young Annie's journey from the hardknock New York orphanage to the luxurious home of billionaire businessman Oliver Warbucks. Boasting one of Broadway's most memorable scores, including "It's the Hard Knock Life," "Easy Street" and the legendary "Tomorrow," fantastically visual choreography, a side-splittingly funny script and, of course, the adorable dog Sandy, it really is no surprise that **ANNIE** has become one of the best-loved family musicals of all time.

Inspired by the famous comic strip Little Orphan Annie which first ran in the New York News in 1924, **ANNIE** made its Broadway debut in April 1977 and played 2,377 performances before closing in 1983. Note 1 Purpose of the Organization

The Sooke Harbour Players Society is a local non-profit organization whose purpose is the delivery of theatrical productions. The society is incorporated under the Society Act of British Columbia as a not-for-profit organization.

Note 2 Significant Accounting Policies

The financial statements of the society have been prepared in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles. The financial statements have, in management's opinion, been properly prepared within reasonable limits of materiality and within the framework of the significant accounting policies summarized below.

Property, Plant and Equipment

Property, plant and equipment are recorded as disbursements in the year of acquisition.

Revenue Recognition

The society follows the deferral method of accounting for contributions. Restricted contributions are recognized as revenue in the year in which the related expenditures are incurred. Unrestricted contributions are recognized as revenue when received or receivable if the amount to be received can be reasonably estimated and collection is reasonably assured. Contributions of materials and services are not recognized as revenue. Note 3 Financial Instruments

The Sooke River Bluegrass Festival Society's primary program is the annual production of a three-day bluegrass music festival held on Father's day weekend at the Sooke River Campground. The festival is family friendly and features an array of local and visiting acoustic musical talent along with food and merchandise vendors, instrument seminars and beautiful scenery. In conjunction with the festival the Society also puts on square dance workshops in the Sooke public schools with a live string band and caller.

Festival Program description

Activities provided and how they are delivered

Many activities take place during the festival weekend. There is a main stage which showcases local, regional, international musical talent. But the biggest activity at a bluegrass festival is the impromptu jamming that happens when a large number of bluegrass musicians congregate. Jamming take place all during the day and into the evening and can be found happening throughout the campground and performance area. As a listener, often the "magic moment" is coming across one of these intimate performances away from the main stage.

Other activities at the festival include: a Saturday night square dance with a live string band and caller under a big top circus tent, instrument seminars, and a moderated "slow-pitch" jam for beginning musicians.

Community Benefit

The Sooke River Bluegrass Festival is an art festival, and art festivals help create and enhance the host community and region's culture. In addition to their social benefits, art festivals have an economic benefit promoting tourism and business by attracting visitors to the community.

We also have a commitment to introducing children to the tradition of acoustic performance music. Children 14 and under are admitted to the festival free to help encourage the attendance of families. And the week prior to the festival we host square dance workshops in the Sooke public schools with a live string band and caller. These workshops give students an opportunity to experience and participate in a musical tradition that is becoming increasingly rare. In addition, all the students

participating in the workshops are given complimentary festival passes so that their parents or guardians can also attend the festival without being charged.

Community Support

We are an all volunteer run organization and the festival weekend requires a contribution of over 400 volunteer hours. Volunteers come from the Sooke Region Volunteer Center, the Sooke Community Association, and the Victoria Bluegrass Association.

The festival also receives financial support through sponsorship. Our 2016 Sponsors included: the District of Sooke, the Royal Canadian Legion #54, the Victoria Bluegrass Association, the Sooke Community Association, and twelve local Sooke businesses.

Why should we receive municipal funding?

Sooke is the host community for the Sooke River Bluegrass Festival. Being host of the festival makes Sooke a primary beneficiary and stakeholder in the event. This spring we will begin producing our 15th production of the festival. The festival is in good financial condition and growing in part due to prudent operation and local financial support. But arts festivals are fragile and assume large financial risk. The District's continued funding will help to insure the festival's continued success.

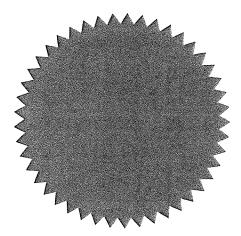

Describe your organization, its mandate and program(s).

The Team Sooke/Juan de Fuca Refugee Sponsorship Committee was formed in December of 2016 under the auspices of the St. Rose of Lima Catholic Church (Sooke). As such, we have a not-for-profit charitable status.

The purpose of the committee is to sponsor a refugee family to come to Canada under the Immigration, Refugees and Citizenship Canada (IRCC) Private Refugee Sponsorship Program.

Our fourteen-member core sponsorship group consists of residents of Sooke and Juan de Fuca, all of whom have undergone prescribed training and criminal record checks in order to participate. Our membership reflects a variety of backgrounds, and we have no specific religious affiliation. Many other people in the community have volunteered to provide support and services once the family arrives.

Describe the community project, program, service, activity or event ("project") for which funds are being sought. Please indicate why this project is unique from other activities and why it should receive funding.

Project description:

Team Sooke/JdF has undertaken to sponsor an Iraqi family of four—parents and two daughters, 13 and 21. Their application has been approved and, assuming all continues to go well, we have been told to expect them to arrive by March 2017.

Once the family arrives, the sponsorship group will assume financial responsibility and social support for the family for a period of twelve months while they get established and become self-sufficient. (See Appendix A for further information about the family and Team Sooke/JdF's sponsorship obligations.)

This is a unique project for Sooke, but in doing this we join forwardthinking small communities all across Canada. This project should receive funding because it will help a deserving family start a new life—an undertaking worthy of a community that prides itself in being the Volunteer Capital of Canada. What We Are Asking For

We are asking for a grant to cover bus passes for the family for a year.

Three adult passes @ \$85/ month = \$3,060 One youth pass @ \$45 X 12 = \$540 TOTAL: \$3,600

As of the end of September we have, though community support, raised funds to cover our original minimum budget of \$50,000 to set up a home, support the family for 12 months, and help pay back the transportation loan the federal government charges refugees (~ \$9,000 for a family of four).

When we came up with the \$50,000 target BC Transit was offering free bus passes to refugee families. This offer expires at the end of 2016, so the family we are sponsoring will now not qualify. This leaves us with a shortfall.

Transportation to Victoria is essential for the family to attend English classes, job training, and other settlement services offered by the Inter-Cultural Association of Victoria. And the adults, like many other Sooke residents, may end up commuting for work.

Purpose of project:

Team Sooke/Juan de Fuca is spearheading what has proven to be a heartfelt community response to the world-wide refugee crisis. The purpose of this project is to give this family a future, and to bring to our community a family that wants to live in peace, better themselves, and contribute to Canada.

Impact and Benefit

Welcoming newcomers will enrich our community. Diversity is a key component in creating a tolerant society, and new perspectives bring new solutions to social issues. Refugees have also proven historically to be an economic benefit to communities. (See Appendix C for information on economic benefits.)

Who Will Benefit

The community as a whole will benefit. Based on the support we've received from individuals, service organizations, schools, faith groups, and regional government, it is clear that participation in the Canada-wide effort to provide a place of safety for refugee families meshes perfectly with Sooke's pride in being a welcoming and supportive community. In addition, most of the money raised to help the family will be spent locally.

The names of those involved in carrying out the project:

The Chair of Team Sooke/JdF is Sid Jorna, who has over-all responsibility for the project. The family's key contacts as they settle in our region will be Sharon Sterling, Howard Taylor, Eman Malak, and Gillian Grigor, but there are an additional eight individuals in core support. We can supply a complete list of sponsorship group members if required.

Date and place of the project:

Support for the family will begin when they arrive in Sooke, which we anticipate to be in March of 2017, and will continue for a year. We would hope to have bus passes available to the family as soon as they arrive, and be valid for a year.

Appendix A: Additional Information About the Family and Sponsorship.

About the Family

The family we are sponsoring was leading an ordinary middle-class life in Mosul, Iraq until 2014. They owned a business, both of their children were in school, and they were active in charity work through their church.

The family was forced from their home under threat of beheading when ISIS took over Mosul in June, 2014. They could not take anything with them, and lost their home, business, and all their belongings. They were lucky to escape with their lives.

Because they are members of a religious minority that is persecuted throughout the Middle East, there is no hope of them returning to Iraq. They are struggling to survive in Lebanon, where they have no official protection and no legal right to work, education, or healthcare.

Obligations as Sponsors

Our sponsorship agreement requires us to provide emotional and financial support to the family for a period of twelve months as they work towards independence. This includes but isn't limited to:

- securing accommodation and setting up a home
- paying their living expenses
- assisting them with all the paperwork that comes with moving to a new country
- ensuring they have access to English-language classes
- liaising with school officials as the youngest daughter enters the school system
- exploring options for the eldest daughter to continue her interrupted education
- helping the parents find work and/or Canadian accreditation for their existing skills
- helping them to understand Canadian culture and learn how to enjoy all the benefits of living in a community such as Sooke

APPENDIX B: Budget Information

Fundraising for refugee sponsorship and the subsequent disbursement of funds during the year of sponsorship is closely monitored by our Sponsorship Agreement Holder (SAH)—the Anglican Diocese of British Columbia via a memorandum of agreement with the Catholic Diocese of Victoria.

The SAH advises us on what we should and should not spend sponsorship money on, and we are required to provide quarterly reports including receipts for all moneys spent. They also set guidelines for amounts we should budget for supporting families of various compositions, which is how we came to our original target goal of \$50,000.*

Because this information involves the family's personal finances, we cannot make public a more-detailed breakdown of our budget projections, nor will we be able to give you a record of how the entire budget was spent during the year of sponsorship.

We can, of course, provide any documentation you require to prove that any grant given to us by the District of Sooke was spent on bus passes for the family.

* Note: This can only be a provisional budget until the family actually arrives. They may have needs (e.g., medical, dental) that we are not as yet aware of. This budget also assumes additional in-kind donations of household goods.

Appendix C: Economic Benefit of Refugee Immigration

Done properly, bringing refugees into our country isn't about charity. It's about investing in the future—both theirs and ours. James Cowan, *Canadian Business Magazine*, September 14, 2015

Economic impact of immigration to Canada

One of the most important studies of the economic impact of immigration to Canada is Morton Beiser's *Strangers at the Gate.* This study looked at the arrival of the Vietnamese boat people who began to arrive in Canada in 1979 to much controversy. The total number of refugees was 60,000, the largest single group of refugees to ever arrive in Canada. Beiser first studied the boat people upon their arrival, finding that few spoke English or French, that most were farmers with few skills useful in Canada, and that they had arrived with no assets with which to establish themselves. Beiser then followed the progress of the boat people to see what effect they would have on Canada. Within ten years of arrival the boat people had an unemployment rate 2.3% lower than the Canadian average. One in five had started a business, 99% had successfully applied to become Canadian citizens, and they were considerably less likely than average to receive some form of social assistance.^{[42][43]}
