



RECOMMENDATION:

THAT THE PARKS AND TRAILS ADVISORY COMMITTEE identify priority projects to recommend to Council for funding in the 2016-2020 Five Year Financial Plan.

1. Background:

The Parks and Trails Advisory Committee has been tasked with identifying priority projects for improving John Phillips Memorial Park, which is the greenspace located along Otter Point Road next to the municipal hall. The Committee looked to the 2006 document which outlined improvements to John Philips Memorial Park and was created with extensive community consultation.

In late 2005, a committee was struck with a mandate to develop and implement a process resulting in a recommendation for John Phillips Memorial Park. This committee represented numerous groups within our community and Municipal Council. The 15 month process received submissions requesting a wide range of amenities including: buildings, recreation facilities, sports fields, special use areas, natural areas, and activity zones.

The 2005 committee developed a philosophy for the park based on the community's response:

- · Maintains the green space and preserves the natural areas.
- Promotes an active, well used park that caters to the general public rather than individual or small group ownership.
- Serves a wide range of community needs for seniors, families, youth, children and tourists and has accessible features.
- Provides a central gathering area for family and neighbourhood groups, festivals, community markets.

- Acts as a hub with pathways connecting to community trails and the downtown core.
- Provides adequate parking with additional access to be by pathways.

The Parks and Trails Advisory Committee is revisiting the 2005-2006 plan for John Phillips Memorial Park and asking the public to prioritize the features that were recommended for the park in 2006. Feedback was received from the public via a Community Consultation Forum held at SEAPARC on February 10th and via online survey Feb 15 though Feb 26.

2. Analysis:

Feedback was received from the public via a Community Consultation Forum held at SEAPARC on February 10th and via online survey Feb 15 though Feb 26. A total of 269 responses were received, 80 via the SEAPARC event and 189 via the online survey. Written responses and call to staff were also received.

The results of both sources were combined and assigning a weighted priority for each response. The result of the analysis are attached and summarised below. Comments for each feature are also attached for context and rationale for ranking these features.

Survey results indicate that a washroom, a loop trail, picnic tables and benches receive the most support from respondents. There is a nearly gap 200 point gap between the top three most popular items and then next three most popular items.

3. Strategic Relevance:

The addition of amenities into John Phillips Memorial Park is in accordance with the 2016 Strategic Plan which prioritises enhancing community livability with the objective to have community gathering spaces within John Phillips Memorial Park as a priority.

4. Financial Impact:

It is estimated that the top three prioritised features will cost \$90,000 to \$190,000 with the washroom having the greatest cost variability depending upon selected location, site improvements and features. While some capital funds are earmarked in the Public Space Enhancement Fund it may not be feasible to implement all three projects in 2016 unless additional funds are allocated. The implementation could be phased over two to three years.



The pond and other marshy areas need to be protected so these species can thrive. There needs to be a buffer around the pond to stop dogs and humans from disturbing the wildlife.

The improvements to the park (pathways and benches) are a good start to making this a popular spot.

What is needed for the Park:

- Signage to indicate it is a park. I spoke with a newcomer to Sooke over the Christmas holidays; he was sitting on a bench by the pond watching the ducks. He asked me if I knew who owned this property and I told him it was a park. He said 'really', why aren't there signs. How many years has this been designated a park? I have been asking for many years for a sign, any sign to indicate this is a park. The main reason I was told for no signs was lack of budget funding. Last thing I was told about signs was that Sooke was waiting for someone or the funds to carve a big sign like McGregor Park. I went to Bill Simmons park and they have signs.....Even a small sign would work in the interim.
- Parking....Where should we park, by the old Mulligans, at City Hall? A good spot for parking would be
 where the old #8 tee box was; which is between the Lombardi Poplars and City Hall. It would have
 access from Otter Point Road and be useful as overflow parking for public meetings. There could be a
 sign indicating it is a park and include doggy do bags, garbage cans and maybe a small washroom (even
 a one-holer would work). Add a trail to meet up with the existing one; this would allow easy access for
 those with strollers.
- Park Boundaries...What area is included in the Park. Are we trespassing when we park at the old Mulligans and walk across their back yard?
- More Benches At Whiffin Spit benches have been sponsored/donated for many years, how about this park
- Washrooms Having washrooms might encourage others to spend more time in the park.
- Picnic Tables or Gazebos Would be nice to stay for lunch. Is there free WI FI?
- **Doggy Do stations** At Whiffin Spit there are rules for dog behaviour along with plastic bags and garbage cans to deposit doggy waste. There should be at least 2, one by the entrance (City Hall) and one by the Townsend Road entry.
- Landscaping Understanding deer are an issue, how about a Native Garden with signs on the species. Maybe high school students could volunteer to maintain as part of their volunteer hours. Or maybe the Garden Club could assist.
- Nature House or Kiosk to display exhibits relevant to the area and to use as a teaching guide.

I think the park has good potential. It should not be chopped up into exclusive special interest groups or used for sports (plenty of those areas in Sooke already). I would like to see it kept as natural as possible leaning toward family activities. With an aim to fitness, how about a play area for the kids. Kids come to play, parents watch the kids; they all have lunch...nice afternoon out.

I have lived in Sooke for 37 years and have witnessed the evolution of this property. I still miss the Golf Course and enjoy walking around it on a regular basis. Open space is so important and needs to be preserved.



Rationale for locating new library in John Phillips Park Cost, location, community asset to share

- It is centrally located, on a bus route, a short walk from the current location along Wadams Way. Over time the downtown core will expand and this is an ideal location looking toward the future.
- 2) The location is walking distance to seniors (Ayre Manor) and several established and new housing subdivisions
- The district already owns the property so costs would be substantially reduced from purchasing expensive property on the water side of Sooke
- 4) Building could be built next to District Hall it would excellent to share shared parking, possibly reducing the amount of parking required if located as a stand alone building.
- 5) Sloping grade on mid-west of property could accommodate a 2floor library with lovely views out over the green space and pond. It could be built to an environmentally high standard taking advantage of earth insulation and south facing passive solar heat.
- 6) Libraries are fast becoming community hubs for many family, senior and children's activities. This location will facilitate many indoor and outdoor activities for families spring and summer programs taking advantage of the park setting.
- 7) Close proximity to Sooke Child, Youth and Family Centre, and Ed West alternative school program (which does not have any access to a library facility at CASA) joint activities and shared events.
- 8) The property is large (10 acres?). A well-planned, 2-story library would be an extremely small footprint and not interfere with existing uses and not cause noise or late night activities to disrupt neighbours.
- 9) Community members may be more amendable to using the location for a library if a comprehensive and well-formulated plan was offered rather than a suggestion without any logical rationale.
